BY THE WILL OF GOD

--ROMANS 15:22-33--

INTRODUCTION:

As we move into the final section of Romans 15 Paul gives us more information about his ministry, especially his future plans for reaching the unreached. Within this section there is one principle that stands out, it is not stated until the end of the chapter, but it is implied throughout, it is the principle that guided Paul in all that he did, it is the principle of living by the will of God. Living by the will of God Paul first writes concerning his future plan of ministry, then his present plan of ministry, and finally asks the church in Rome to pray for him and gives them three specific requests that he desired be answered according to God's will and purpose for his life.

- I. PAUL'S FUTURE PLAN (Romans 15:22-24)
 - a. Paul begins this new section by laying out for the church in Rome his _____ plans.

Paul shows us what a man who lived by the will of God is like. Living by God's will did not stop him from planning for the future. The plans that Paul made were always held in an open hand before God, because more than anything Paul wanted to be obedient to the will of God.

Paul also never allowed his plans to get in the way or interfere with work that God had given him to do, he knew his plans came only after he completed the task before him.

Paul also prayed for his plans, that they might be realized if they fit into God's will, then he rested in God's peace to see what God would do and how God would use him.

It is this kind of life lived in the will of God that allowed Paul to say near the end of his life, "*I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith; in the future there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day; and not only to me, but also to all who have loved His appearing.*" (2 Timothy 4:7–8, NASB95)
