## <u>THE CHRISTIAN LIFE – UNITY IN THE BODY – PART 6</u> --ROMANS 15:7-13--

## INTRODUCTION:

Last Sunday we started Romans 15 where Paul begins to wrap up his teaching on unity in the body by giving us two additional principles that relate to the importance of unity. We looked at the first principle last week in verses 1-6 and it concerned pleasing others and we do this by following Christ's example of pleasing His Father. Paul taught that as we show concern for one another then we will be of one mind according to Christ Jesus and the result will be to glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ with one unified voice.

This morning we will look at the second principle and again it has to do with glorifying God as we rejoice with one another for God's eternal plan of redemption for mankind provided through the Lord Jesus Christ.
